Why people need house...

- 23% of Indonesia population had no access to an improved water source in 2004, ranking Indonesia 51st out of 177 countries. (Human Development Reports: Indonesia, UNDP)
- 40% of lowest-income Indonesians live overcrowded conditions with inadequate shelter from the elements and under stressful, unhealthy conditions. (Asian Development Bank)



National program

Habitat for Humanity Indonesia built its first houses in 1999 in Yogyakarta and operates in both rural and urban areas throughout the country. Its affiliates are in Jakarta, Bandung, Yogyakarta, Surabaya in Java island; Manado in North Sulawesi, Batam in Riau, Medan in Sumatera and Bali. HFH Indonesia has served more than 13,000 families through affiliates in regular and disaster program.

Community Information

Most of the community that Habitat's help are labors, garbage collector, teachers and merchant with income less than IDR 1,500,000 (USD 167)/month. The family' income are too low to build their own houses. Most of the houses are have no structure, proper ventilation, earth floor and unsanitary. Those who do not own land they also cannot afford government low cost housing schemes. They are also often staying with their old parents and others family in an aged house.



“When I stayed in my old house, I never slept at night. This is area used to be a forest and my house only used plywood as a wall. It had a soiled floor and thus, snakes and worms often entered my house. My husband works during the day in one of the dockyard companies in Batam and he must be very tired. So, I was the one who guarded ourselves from snakes and worms. Our hope is having a decent house and comfortable to stay in.”

Types of construction for volunteers

The core first stage home normally measures 21 sq. m. Houses use cement slab foundations and are made from concrete blocks and plywood with wood frames clay tiles for roofs or aluminum. It takes between 14 and 21 days to build a house.

Volunteers may work on existing home renovations and complete home construction. Volunteers may help to: transport materials; fill foundation with dirt, stone, sand; compact floors; mix mortar; lay bricks; and clean and paint doors and windows.

Lodging

The team stays in a lodge or guest house or 1 to 3 star hotel. Typically double-occupancy rooms (2 twin beds) with shared bathrooms & toilet

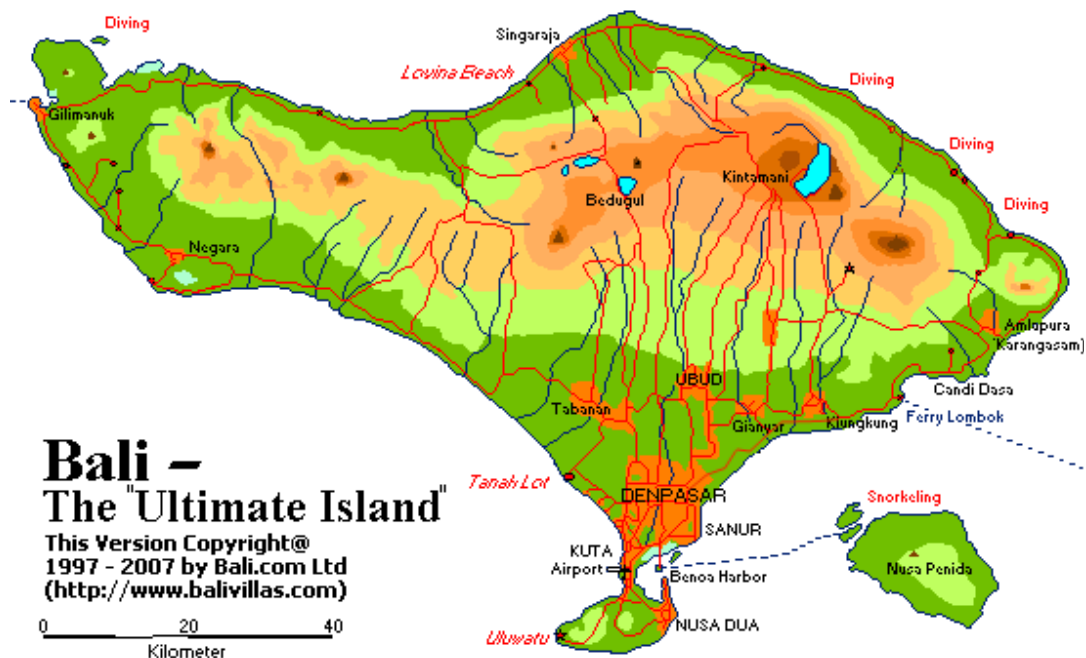

Project Name	Bitung IDPs Resettlement Project (IDPs = Internally Displace Persons)
Location	Dembet, Bitung, North Sulawesi
Back ground	<p>Between 1999 and 2000, thousands of people fled to North Sulawesi from surrounding areas as a result of ethnic & sectarian conflicts in the region. This conflict spread across the entire North Maluku region, including the islands of Halmahera, Tidore, Ternate, Makian and Morotai.</p> <p>One of the considered safe destinations to escape from the tension was Bitung, located 200km from Manado, the Capital of North Sulawesi. There are currently 862 families (3955 people) living in temporary shelter in seven IDPs settlements. Over the last 9 years, the International Red Cross has coordinated a relief effort by providing temporary shelter, water & sanitation facilities and other basic needs in the refugee camps. However, these efforts were focused on emergency response and do not include long term support.</p> <p>One of the settlement areas, called 'Dembet', has 125 families currently living in temporary shelter. The families in the settlement are the target beneficiaries for this proposed project and were selected on the basis of need/vulnerability and commitment to partnering with Habitat for Humanity in improving their living conditions.</p> <p>The Resettlement project aims to work closely with these 125 families over a period of two (2) years to relocate them to a new site and improve their living conditions and overall quality of life.</p>

Location	Gitgit Village, Singaraja, North Bali Jembrana, West Bali
Back ground	<p>Gitgit & Jembrana is part of tourist objects in Bali which is known for its waterfall & Lovina beach in North Bali and Mejangana Island in West Bali. While many tourism object surrounded with nice accommodation and good facilities, many people in Gitgit & Jembrana still stay in poverty.</p> <p>There are 2,967 people (654 households) living in Gitgit (2008) and 58% (358 families) considered as the poorest since their income below IDR 900,000/months to cover monthly minimum meal cost .</p> <p>In Jembrana, there are 21,210 people (6,502 households) living in poor housing condition.</p> <p>Housing Need—13,81% still rent a land and house, while the remainings owned land as most of them inherit the land from their family. The big families used to stay in a cluster when they have settlements and also a little pura (worship place). The housing condition is still below standard, have no structure and proper sanitation.</p> <p>Photos</p>
